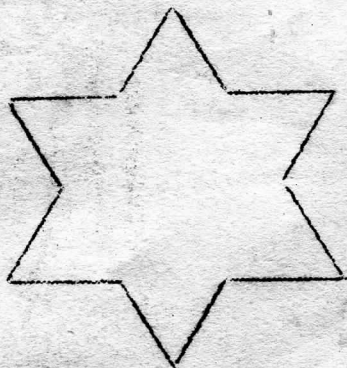

EYE WITNESS REPORT

On arriving at the Walthamstow track some 45 minutes before the match was due to start, I was confronted by the sight of Steward Terry Greenaway busy cutting the grass in the centre of the track. "I want to have a clear view in case of any hooking" he explained. It was an unnecessary precaution, however, for although the match was very close, and the result in doubt almost until the end, the riding was clean, fair and friendly throughout the match.

Western Stars, who have recently had trouble in raising a team, were almost back to full strength. Only absentees being Sid Luke, transferred to Tolworth and Bert Hammond (O.H.M.S) Roy Ruffoll also on National Service was released for the weekend after Manager Mr. Jones wrote to his Commanding Officer. The Stars did in fact take 10 riders with them, the two unlucky ones being Tony Cathcart and Dave Jenkins two riders who could command a first string berth in most teams.

Raynes Park won the toss, and chose inside, getting off to a good start with F. Bodford and D. Chivers taking a 4-2 from M. Shaw. In heat 2 Ruffoll and Cable scored a 5-1 over Smith and Penniket, to give Weston a two point lead. Tigers regained the lead 10-8 in heat 3 with Baker and Andrews taking a 5-1 from Webb and Dryden, but a 5-1 from Shaw and Harvey in heat 4, and it was Weston in the lead again. A 4-2 and a 5-1 in heats 6 and 7, gave Raynes Park a 4 point lead, but it was still anybody's match. Heat 8 saw the only "incident" of the match when in the race for the first bend Shaw was nearly sandwiched between Smith and Penniket causing him to fall. The Steward stopped the race and allowed all four riders in the re-run. This was won by Shaw, a 3 all, and another in heat 9, leaving Tigers still in the lead 29-25.

Turning point of the match came in heat 10 when Cable (Weston) in the inside position touched the tapes and was excluded. His partner Humphrey could only manage one place and Tigers were 6 points up.

The remaining 6 heats were all shared 3-3 so Raynes Park became visitors by 51-45, the same score by which they defeated Longbridge Leopards.

Best for Weston was Captain Maury Shaw, with 12, including a last heat win over Baker, robbing him of his maximum. P. Baker for Raynes Park was brilliant, his getting and speed round the outside of the first bend had to be seen to be believed.

He was well backed up by the remainder of the team, who in general seemed fitter than the Weston Boys, and managed 4 laps, on the large Walthamstow's track (Southern Premier race 4 laps as against only 3 in Middlesex.)

Surely no team has ever had a harder path to the final. Defeating present champions Tolworth Tudors home and away in the first round, then repeating the performance against Tooting Tigers in the County Final.

Then came Essex Champions the "unbeatable" Longbridge Leopards whom they defeated by six points. And now Weston Stars. They now have only one further hurdle to jump, before reaching the final, that being Oxford Champions Drayton Vampires. In the event of Raynes Park Tigers reaching the Final, it will be held on the Wornwood Scrubs track.

Mr. Fred Goodos' great efforts to restart Birmingham Lions, the pioneering Club in these parts, were recently realized on June 11th when several of the "old" riders along with a few novices; plus Eric Edwards back from Leicester were visited in a League Match by the other South Birmingham Club, Elmdon Bees who won a very hard fought match 51½-43½. The cinder surface which was very slick suited Edwards 11pts and Ray Goode 11pts (Lions). A Bennett 10pts was on top form for Elmdon.

The match was not settled until heat 15 (Reserves Race) when C. Deacon (Bees) won from P. Birch (Lions) with J. Etheridge (Bees) 3rd; this 4-2 ensured certain victory for Elmdon.

Elmdon Bees at home to 1st division Sutton Stars were inspired by their successors. The Lions, rode in very determined fashion to defeat their visitors 57-49, although they could make very little impression on Sutton's Harry Leasby, who scored a 15pt "max". John Elner was top scorer for the "Bees" with 8 pts, well supported by D. Hickman 7, M. Rose 7, and C. Deacon 7.

Aston Boys' Club were the visitors to Danson Lane, Elmdon and in continuous rain on a track with the bottom bend more like a swamp they were sunk without trace. Elmdon opened with two 5-1's and a deciding factor was the way the "Locals" slid their bikes round the 1st bend in speedway style. The steward, M. Brady, (Aston) twice considered calling the match off, but to no effect did anyone agree with him. The final score being 66-30.

After the match the Aston Manager also suggested that Elmdon were too strong to ride as a second division side, in effect they should be made to ride in the 1st Division? Very sporting I must say!

Sutton Stars suprisingly crashed 35-61 away to Kingstanding "B" who mollowed a few Junior riders. Jim Bond 6, Ray Day 6, were the best for the "Stars".

Pattinson 12, Evans 11, J. Blakoy 9, Kean 9, were the best point scorers for Kingstanding.

The big clash took place when Kingstanding "A" defeated the "B" team 56-39, Harrison and Mills 11 each were top scorers for the "A" while Gorry Kean the "International" was left to do the bulk of the scoring for the "B" team, with 11 pts.

When Aldridge Hummers visited Kingstanding "B" Team they too like Sutton found the local side carried too many "big guns" for

MIDDIX REVIEW

JULY 28th. Wembley visited Langley, and with 5 riders, pulled off a good win by 63-47. Geoff Pearce rode well for the Leopards to score 11. For Wembley, Laurie Birdoe hit his best form so far this season, and won his 4 races, with good support from Alec and Roy Fraser, with 14 each.

Wembley now top the League. Hendon were at home to Ruislip, and with Alan Cowland on holiday, were no match for a lively Ruislip team, and went down by 35-76. Best for Hendon was Brian Devereux with 9; and for Ruislip, Malcolm Richards did the scorers with 18 pts, with good backing from Billy Whyte with an 11pt Max, Johnny Woods 15. Piding in his 1st match for nearly 2 years was Ex-Southall and Greenford rider, Colin Roper, he should soon be able to add some strength to Ruislip who have been short of riders for some matches. Newcomers to the League Bushey Aces who were at home to Huddersdon. The Horta Harps were too strong though, and had their 1st win in the League; score being 30-80. Bill Gadsby and Eric Ellis topped the Bushey scorers with 7 each. For Huddersdon Clive Hitch scored a good 20 pt maximum with good support from Alan Catloy 12.

In the secondround of Middlesex K.O. Cup, Harfield Pirates were away to Whipps Cross Colts "B", the visitors soon settled down, and with some good team riding held a commanding lead over their younger opponents; the result being 30-66. For Whipps Cross, Terry Platford rode very hard for only 6 pts, but was worth more; he's a good 'un and should be all the better by next season. For Harfield, Lenny Richards won his 5 rides without any effort, with good support from Pete Leckie, Dave Stonex and Roger Seymour, who were unbeaten by an opponent. - So, Harfield go to the Semi Finals.

Another 2nd round match was between Wembley and Walthamstow. The 1st leg was a very even match, and after 16 exciting heats, Walthamstow managed to win by 4 pts. 46-50, well supported by Roy Fraser with 10, and Keith Bristowe and Roger Downhirst with 9 each. And for the Wolves Johnny Morris rode well for 11 pts, and Pete Fraser 10. In the returns match the following night, resulted in a clear cut win for the Wolves by 57-38. aggregate. Wolves 107, All Stars 84. Tolworth who could have ridden Weston, were unable to field a team, and gave Weston the points.

On Sunday 5th August The Middlesex A and B Test Teams were at home to Essex A and B on the Hayes track. Middlesex Manager Mr. Merner, had to make some hurried changes to the A Team, as Johnny Dryden has had to stop riding for a while, for health

reasons, and Rog Fraser didn't turn up. In the opening heat Essex were away to a 5-0 start, and were 3 pts up by heat 8. Middlesox pulled back in the next race and were one point behind and at heat 13, took the lead for the 1st time. 39-37. Essex drew level in heat 16 and took the lead again in the next race with a 5-1 and got two more in the closing heats to win by 65-52. Heat 13, was the turning point, Dixie Dean was racing for the bend with Roy Milano both trying to get near to the bend, and it ended in a nasty crash, with Dixie biting the dust. Milano was disqualified, and the race re-run. Dixie won it, but that was to be his last race as he was in great pain and it was thought that his collar bone was broken so an ambulance was called for Dixie. I am told also he had concussion and bruised kidneys. We don't know how long he will be out for but we hope it won't be long. The B match resulted in an easy win for Essex over a somewhat depleted side, 73-47.

On Monday (August) the 1st round of the Best Pairs took place. At Bushoy it was local pair Bill Gadsby and Frank Males who finished joint winners, with Harefields pair, Pete Lockie and Dave Stonex, with 20 pts. Third were Brian Betts and Berny Cable 19½. At Harefield it was Hendon's top pair of Alan Coland and Brian Dovereaux who won the round with 18 pts. Close behind were the Ruislip Pair Johnny Woods and Ian Dunford with 17 pts. Third were Colin Brabent and Alan Lusted with 12 pts from Bushey.

This was decided at a recent meeting. Already riders are going to other teams. International rider Alan Wood, along with Ron and Norman Sutton have plumped for The Gladiators. For Ron, it is renewing his association with the Club, started in '54 and '55. Riders yet to move are Fred Prior, John Blatch, Gerald Spooner and Reg Boxall.

Dave Stevens, South Essex Chairman has had to resign his position on the Board due to Gastritis. He will continue to run Thundersley, although Tony Fryer takes over as Team Manager and Peter Bambury as Secretary.

Cycle Speedway Argus will continue to be published by Dave but edited by Ted Sear, for the next few months.

Longbridge Leopards, following their letter of complaint against the officiating Steward at their Inter-County Tie, held at Hayes recently, directed to the N.A.C.S. Association, anxiously await the outcome. They are confident, that they can win, should a replay take place. Ron Gibbons, excluded at the gate in the very first heat for moving, said that he can now keep still, but promptly got excluded on Sunday, in his last ride.

Stocky Jim Morris, tousled-haired bomb of the Walthamstow Wolves made a name for himself when winning the 1957 Essex Individual Riders Championship Final, at Sholley, Ongar. With 13 points, he just beat last year's champion, Sid Tonlyn, of the Longbridge set-up.

Brian Anthony, of The Gladiators, made history in a purely personal way on Sunday, when he collected his first ever match maximum, helping his team to beat Rayleigh Pirates. He very nearly repeated it at Hawbush three hours later, when he recorded 17 from six rides, losing only to Dave Stitchman, of East Ham, in a real hundering. This was a disastrous match for Alf Cox, of Hawbush. Unbeaten on this circuit for seven months, Alf admitted defeat to the flying Anthony three times.

Bob Pike is again in the news. This revolutionary of Essex Cycle Speedway is forever coming up with something new. His latest idea is a 12 heat match run between two teams of three pairs. After the mid-way mark, Team Managers may shuffle their riders as they think fit.

Scoring takes place as a 5-0 when 1st and 2nd is granted, or 1-0 when only a 1st. Personal points do not count. This was recently tried out at Hawbush.

The new South Essex Junior League opened recently and is now in full swing. Favourites are Whipps Cross Comets "C", Walthamstow Diamonds, and Thundersley Vultures. The Crusaders, after having their first match with only three riders, have to settle on six of a bunch that is constantly increasing. They include Dave Green, Tony Steer, Alf Milham, Stan Lucking, Colin Bradbrook, Colin Harris and Peter Agland.

Hoddosdon, who have only had one or two matches this season and have not yet settled down, found the going too heavy for them.

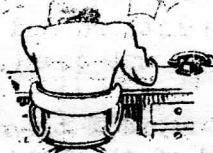

THE EDITOR'S CONTRIBUTION

It's a pity that Essex's fine Test victory over Middlesex was marred by filthy riding by one of their team. In heat 13 in the race for the bend, Milano barged Dean off his bike, this was the third time that he had used questionable tactics, and the steward disqualified him from the rest of the meeting. Dean won the re-run, but afterwards collapsed and was taken to hospital with a dislocated shoulder and bruised kidneys. Milano's comment was "I'm out for the rest of the meeting, now so is Dean". After this incident, the majority of the spectators "melted away" I don't suppose they took a very good opinion of the sport with them either.

While on the subject of Test matches, Middlesex seem to be going in for them in a big way, with home & away matches for A & B sides, against Birmingham, Essex, Leicester, Sussex and possibly Manchester. This is all very well for the riders selected to represent their County, but what of the remainder. Teams like Hoddesdon or Bushey whose riders do not take part in tests, can always arrange challenge matches, although they would undoubtedly prefer to catch up on their league matches. Riders from teams that supply test riders or official are not so fortunate, true they could always go along and watch to cheer their team mates on, but when test matches take place on 5 consecutive weeks as they do at present, the novelty wears a bit thin. In mid summer this did not matter so much, as mid-week racing could take place, but now that the evenings are beginning to draw in, this is not possible for some teams. So now not only are the majority of clubs getting behind with their league fixtures but far worse about half of the riders in N.W. Hixx will go 5 weeks without any organized racing at all.

For all individual or best pairs events this year, most riders have either, turned up at the wrong track, not turned up at all, or arrived about 1 hour late. The practice of allowing 1/2 hour grace has been so abused, (the Weston Stars round started 2 hours late) that at last something is being done about it. As an experiment both rounds of the Best-Pairs semi-final on Sunday 25th August will be held on the same track (Uxbridge) Riders are being told to be present at 2.0pm. Racing will start at 2.30 sharp, any pair (or part of pair) not there at that time will be replaced by reserves. This should also suit riders who do not like going to an away track when their mate is drawn at home.

LANCASHIRE & CHESHIRE BULLETIN

LANCASHIRE V CHESHIRE inter County round, National Team Championship.

In the first inter county round of the National Team Champ'ship, Carrs Wood and Belle Vue were drawn against each other. To save travelling both teams agreed to ride on the Longsight track. In the past when Hunters & Cobras have clashed, much ink has been used about bad sportmanship and the like, but this match was different, because both teams rode themselves to a standstill, and steward Mr Ashtonhurst did not even have to warn any rider, let alone exclude anyone.

The result of this hard and fairly fought match was 48 all, so the much criticised regulation regarding a match race to decide the winning team had to be brought into operation. Most unfortunate for Belle Vue, who are an all round team, whilst Carrs Wood have several stars. So the teams had to leave McGee and Moston to decide their fate. The Belle Vue rider won the toss, but he could only hold Moston for half a lap. The second race with Moston on the inside was just a formality, McGee put everything into it, but just could not catch up.
